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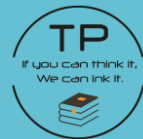

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Numbered examples must be glossed and translated into English (in case of articles in English, if the examples are non-English) using the *Leipzig Glossing Rules* (in case of linguistics examples). Examples should be left-aligned. Example numbers should be in Arabic numerals which should be within parentheses. The sub-example numbers should be in (a), (b), (c), ..., (n) format. Data in running text should be in *Italic*. If there are examples from different languages, the respective names of the languages should be given within parentheses to the extreme right of the data line. If the data is cited from a source the citation should appear as in the following example. An example should be separated with one line space from the other examples or paragraphs. cf.-

- (1) (a) *gàbùn* *ʰákʰú-aó* *sùr* *sùr* *pʰuì-gùñ* (Bodo)
tomorrow class-LOC who RED come-FUT
‘Who are coming to the class tomorrow?’ (Brahma 2021: 37)

In-text citations should consist of the author(s)’s surname(s) and the publication year, followed by page number(s) preceded by a colon (e.g., Boro 2014: 215) but if the author’s surname is already mentioned in the running text such as ‘according to Boro’ then write (2014: 215) after the surname. For more than two authors, use *et al* after first author’s surname. For multiple citations together, they are to be separated by semicolons and listed in chronological order.
